Message from the Principal...

October can be a *frightening* month, *Halloween*, the intensity of fall *Sports*, *Homecoming* anticipation and excitement, and oh yeah, that time of year when if you are a student who isn't keeping up with your school work, you might have one of those *dreams*, you know the one, where "you go to class, you sit down, you realize you have a test you haven't studied for, AND you are in your underwear." *That is terrifying!*

So with all of this *stuff* going on, what is a parent to do? My suggestion, punt. Okay just kidding, I tried that with one of my kids, didn't work, bounced right back. What I would seriously suggest is keep an account of what your student is doing daily, make sure they are keeping up with their studies, getting enough sleep, eating right, and throw away their phone (maybe the last suggestion is going a bit overboard, but tell me you haven't been tempted, am I right?). I am sure it is no surprise to any parent that their student sometimes needs guidance, even when they get to high school and we begin to believe they are on the cusp of adulthood.

Now is the opportunity in my newsletter when I fit in what our process is for contacting the school if you are concerned about your student. Here is our procedure:

Parent Concern Guidelines

Step I

Contact the teacher if it is a situation regarding the instruction of a student.

Step II

Contact your student's counselor for their help if not resolved at the teacher level.

Step III

Contact the building principal with concerns/questions

that have not been resolved at the teacher level. If questions and concerns are general in nature, it is appropriate to contact the principal directly.

Step IV

If concerns/questions are not addressed adequately at the building level, the Superintendent or designee is the next contact source.

Step V

Concerns of a general nature that have not been adequately addressed by the Superintendent's office, may be directed to the Board of Directors in writing, through the Superintendent's office. Questions and/or concerns about these guidelines, can be directed to the Superintendent's office at 425-844-4504.

There you go. Bottom line is, if you are concerned with how your student is doing, don't hesitate to reach out to a teacher and get a dialogue going. I know our teachers are very busy, they all have around 130 to 150 students they see daily, but I also know that if you email them (preferred by most) or give them a call, they will respond.

Next up for our freshmen parents, this is the month when we get started on our freshmen conferences. Between now and February, all freshmen and their parents will get an invitation to come into the counseling center and meet with their student and their student's counselor to go over a four-year plan. I would encourage all of you to attend this meeting if at all possible. You will get a great deal of information about graduation requirements and what to look forward to as your student progresses through the next four years, and these four years will fly by! With the new 24 credit requirement by the state, there is little room for our students to fail classes, making it even more important to get the information you need to get a good start on high school.

Counselors are also now calling in seniors and making sure they are on track for this year as they head toward graduation and beyond. Juniors will also have an individual conference this year to make sure they are preparing for their senior year, and counselors will also be meeting with sophomores in small groups to discuss their moving forward. Our counselors are obviously very busy people, but please remember that if your student feels like they need to meet with their counselor at any time, they can always set up a meeting by going to the counseling center and putting in a request.

Finally, regarding homecoming. This year we are at the EMP (aka MoPOP) at the Seattle Center. We love

Where: The EMP/MoPOP is located at 325 5th Ave N., Seattle, WA. Students need to provide their own transportation to and from the dance.

Who: This dance is open to all Cedarcrest students in grades 9 through 12.

Guests: Students are allowed to bring a guest from another school as long as the guest is high school aged or under the age of 21 and a guest pass is completed and turned into the main office by Wednesday October 18th. NO EXCEPTIONS!

What to Wear: Homecoming is a semi-formal dance. Male students are expected to dress in sport coats,

Following is our general dance policies.

School Dance Policy

Dances will be chaperoned by parents of CHS students and Riverview School District staff members only. Students who wish to bring a guest from another school must obtain a "Dance Guest Request Form" from the office. This form must be completed and turned in to the office by 3:00 p.m. the Wednesday before the event.

School rules regarding student behavior, use of tobacco, alcohol and illegal drugs will be upheld at dances. Sexually suggestive dances, gestures and physical contact are prohibited.

The following guidelines will be enforced:

- All dancers need to face their partner.
- Keep both feet near the floor. No sitting or lying down on the dance floor.
- No bumping or grinding with your partner.
- Hand placement on your partner must be appropriate for a school setting.
- There must be space between partners.
- No freak dancing or "moshing" on the dance floor.
- Any other behaviors deemed to be inappropriate by the chaperones will be stopped.

Students who engage in such behavior will be asked to leave the dance. Any student who is asked to leave the dance will not be entitled to a refund. The administration has the right and responsibility to deny entrance at the door and any students choosing to ignore any rules shall be asked to leave the dance. Students who are truant from school on the Friday before a dance or are under an out of school suspension on the Friday before a dance are not allowed to attend an event the following Saturday and will not receive a refund.

Save the Date: PSAT Saturday, October 14

The PSAT is most appropriate for 10 & 11th grade college-bound students. The test is good preparation and practice for the SAT, comparing you with other college-bound students nationally and your score will give you a prediction of your SAT score. Taking the PSAT as a sophomore is a good way to improve scores by the junior year. This is particularly important for juniors to enter the National Merit Scholarship competition.

PSAT will be offered on Saturday, October 14 at the ESC from 8:00-Noon. Fee is \$20.00. Payments can be made beginning Monday, October 2 in the main office before school 6:30-7:30, break, lunch & after school. 2:15-3:00 pm. Payments can be made in the main office with Patricia or through eFunds online. Payment will be accepted until 2:00 pm - October 12. Payments **will not** be accepted at the door on Saturday morning. We have a limited number of spaces available for students to test and registration is first come, first serve. Register early!

Students must present a current Student ID and their Social Security Number on the morning of the testing.

Dairy Cattle:

In the dairy cattle division, Dylan Aldridge won reserve champion in showmanship and Leann Starns received grand champion for her Jersey Heifer.

Dairy Goats:

Showing FFA dairy goats were Leila Misallati, Ella Dianich and Anna Christensen. Leila won champion in showmanship and type contests while Ella also earned a champion ribbon. Anna won best in show and outstanding dairy goat exhibitor.

Toxic Stress and the Pressure to Succeed

MAKING FAMILY HEALTH A PRIORITY

In this lecture, Dr. Kastner will focus on what parents can do to enhance their children's resilience, social and emotional competence, and healthy resistance to stress. By understanding how much stress kids experience, parents are able to help their children with coping strategies and wise decision-making. The good news is that by making family health a priority, parents will build skills for improving their own well-being and their children's.

PARENTS FEEL PRESSURE

Within a high performance culture, where success is often equated with test scores and grades, parents can feel the same pressures as their children. Research shows that teens benefit when parents balance reasonable academic goals with healthy habits related to sleep, authoritative parenting, and media management.

HARMFUL IMPACT OF COMMON STRESSORS

Children and teens can be impacted by stressors like trauma, household dysfunction, growing up with substance abuse, parent discord, mental illness and, for advantaged kids, by excessive pressure to perform academically and their parents' own stress levels. Toxic stress has been associated with depression, anxiety, learning problems, suicidality, early sexual activity and substance use.

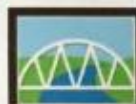

Weapons

State Law (RCW 28A-600.420 and School District Policy 3200 prohibit the possession of firearms and weapons at school. This law pertains to guns, knives, clubs, firecrackers, and explosives. Dangerous weapons also include toy or "dummy" or look-alike objects. The full text of the law and the definitions of dangerous weapons, as provided RCW9.41.250 and RCW 9.41.280, are on file in the school office. Possession of firearms on school property will result in a one year mandatory expulsion, subject to appeal with notification to parents and law enforcement. Any violations of these guidelines by students constitutes grounds for expulsion from the Riverview School District and the public schools of the State of Washington, in accordance with the due process provisions of Washington State Law and Board Policy
