Message from the Principal...

PSAT

The PSAT will be offered on Saturday, October 13 at the ESC from 8:00 AM - Noon. Cost is \$20.00. Registration will be on a first come first serve basis starting Monday, October 1. More information will be given out regarding the exam and payment options at an informational meeting scheduled for September 27 during Advisory in the LRC. Students must present a current Student ID on the morning of the testing. Juniors interested in qualifying for the National Merit Scholarship must take the PSAT this year, even if they took the PSAT as sophomores.

Need help filing the FAFSA? We understand that filing the FAFSA can be an intimidating and potentially frustrating task and often times families have a lot of questions while trying to accurately file. Cedarcrest believes all families should have access to college, therefore we want to provide a valuable resource to help you fill out your FAFSA. We will have financial aid experts from our local colleges here along with our counseling staff to help you complete your FAFSA with ease and individually answer any questions you might have. Filing for the FAFSA is not only your access to federal grants and loans, it is also a necessary tool for colleges to determine your eligibility for scholarships! Nearly all colleges and scholarship organizations require submission of this application. The night will begin with a brief informational presentation to help families better understand the financial aid process, then families will go onto the FAFSA website and complete their FAFSA application with the help of our experts. Both the student and parent(s) need to attend. We strongly recommend BOTH the student AND one parent go onto the FAFSA website at www.fafsa.ed.gov prior to the event to register for your FSA ID (blue lock icon at top of webpage). This will save a lot of valuable time on Nov. 14th. The same website is where to file for your FAFSA and is loaded with useful information to help you. To the right is more information and what to bring to this resourceful event happening in our Cedarcrest Library on October 17th from 6:00-7:30 pm.

What's the FAFSA?

FAFSA stands for Federal Application for Federal Student Aid. It is the standard form students must complete to apply for federal and state need-based assistance/aid programs and, in some circumstances, campus-based assistance/aid.

Am I eligible to file the FAFSA?

The U.S. Department of Education Office of Federal Student Aid sets the requirements for federal financial aid eligibility. For the most up-to-date and accurate list of eligibility criteria, visit the federal student aid site at studentaid.ed.gov/eligibility/basic-criteria.

I'm not eligible to file the FAFSA. What do I do?

If you are not eligible to file the FAFSA due to immigration status, you may be able to file the WASFA. You can get help filing the WASFA at a College Goal Washington event.

What should I bring?

There are several things you need to bring.

- Social Security card or Alien registration card (if you are a permanent resident). (FAFSA only)
- Driver's license.
- Student's prior year's tax return (2017) if you filed taxes.
- Your income information. This includes bank statements and a W-2 or pay stub.
- Both student and parent
- Parents' financial information. Parents should bring a copy of their previous year's tax return (2017) as well.
- One parent's social security number. If neither of your parents have one, you may still file the FAFSA.
- Additional financial information -- such as child support statements, TANF or welfare information, real estate, stocks or bonds investments, family business or farm info.

The beginning of a new school year provides an excellent opportunity to start or re-establish good habits to get off to successful start. Good habits to consider committing to your life include:

- Regularly checking Skyward for grades and assignments (at least twice a week)

Power Packs: Weekend meal supplements for families in need

We are fortunate that our surrounding community partners in these efforts. As such, a local organization has a resource that you might be interested in. Weekend Power Packs are free supplemental food items provided by local volunteers in our community for children in need. Food items are sent home at the end of the week in your student's backpack. These food items include breakfast, lunch, and snack items. Families in the program are kept confidential and the delivery of the Weekend Power Packs is done discretely. Students whose families have requested this service will initially get a reminder note to pick up a package in the attendance office on Fridays and then once they are in the routine of picking up their Weekend Power Pack, they can just automatically go down and get their package each Friday. The service will automatically continue each week throughout the school year for families who have requested to receive Weekend Power Packs.

Homecoming Dance

School Dance Information

Every year we have many questions, especially from parents of our freshman students about how our major dances are organized. So here is all the information you will need to send your daughter or son off to a swinging time at a CHS dance!

The Dance: Homecoming is our largest dance of the year where we typically host over 500 students! Because of the size of this dance, as well as a desire of the students to go out of the valley for dining, this dance is held off campus.

When: This year the homecoming dance will be held on Saturday October 6th at the Pacific Science Center. The dance starts at 8:00PM and is over at 11:00PM.

Where: The Pacific Science Center is located at 200 2nd Ave N, Seattle, WA 98109. Students need to provide their own transportation to and from the dance.

Who: This dance is open to all Cedarcrest students in grades 9 through 12.

Guests: Students are allowed to bring a guest from another school as long as the guest is high school aged or under the age of 21 and a guest pass is completed and turned into the main office by Wednesday October 3rd. **NO EXCEPTIONS!**

What to Wear: Homecoming is a semi-formal dance. Male students are expected to dress in sport coats, suits or tuxedos. Female students are expected to dress in an evening dress or gown. All students and their guests must be dressed appropriately or they will be denied entrance.

Cost: The cost varies depending on the site. This year we anticipate the cost to be \$40 (with ASB) to \$45 per person (guests and students without ASB). Students with ASB cards are given a \$5 discount.

School Dance Policy

Dances will be chaperoned by parents of CHS students and Riverview School District staff members only. Students who wish to bring a guest from another school must obtain a "Dance Guest Request Form" from the office. This form must be completed and turned in to the office by 3:00 p.m. the Wednesday before the event.

School rules regarding student behavior, use of tobacco, alcohol and illegal drugs will be upheld at dances. Sexually suggestive dances, gestures and physical contact are prohibited.

The following guidelines will be enforced:

- All dancers need to face their partner.
- Keep both feet near the floor. No sitting or lying down on the dance floor.
- No bumping or grinding with your partner.
- Hand placement on your partner must be appropriate for a school setting.
- There must be space between partners.
- No freak dancing or "moshing" on the dance floor.
- Any other behaviors deemed to be inappropriate by the chaperones will be stopped.

Students who engage in such behavior will be asked to leave the dance. Any student who is asked to leave the dance will not be entitled to a refund. The administration has the right and responsibility to deny entrance at the door and any students choosing to ignore any rules shall be asked to leave the dance. Students who are truant from school on the Friday before a dance or are under an out of school suspension on the Friday before a dance are not allowed to attend an event the following Saturday and will not receive a refund.

At the end of August, Cedarcrest FFA's show team went to the Evergreen State Fair to exhibit their livestock, and horticulture entries. Our program would like to recognize the students who put in the effort all summer long by working with their animals and plants. This year, we had sixteen exhibitors showing their animals in almost every barn available, including dairy goats, meat goats, dairy cows, sheep, horses, poultry, and fiber animals.

Horses

The horse showmen started off the week with Brooke Downing receiving a champion ribbon, Haley Wilkes getting senior champion, and Ella Dianich placing first in the bareback class.

Dairy Goats

Showing dairy goats for Cedarcrest were Anna Christensen, Ella Dianich, and Bethany Smith. Ella won grand champion, and Anna won reserve grand champion in their senior division for the showmanship contest. Bethany won grand champion in the novice class. Ella finished off the dairy goat shows by receiving supreme champion in the type contest for all her goats.

Meat Goats

In the meat goat division, Dietrich Brooks won grand champion in his division, showing his five meat goats.

Dairy cattle

The Cedarcrest students showing dairy were Kadence Fry, Dylan Aldridge, Lacey Vanhulle Sierra Owens, and Madison Rose. Dylan achieved grand champion junior showman, Sierra received grand champion novice showman, and Lacey got reserve grand champion novice showman.

Fiber animals

Keaton Downing, Parker Downing, Sawyer Vondra, and Ellie Case all showed their llamas and alpacas in the senior division. Parker won grand champion, and Ellie won reserve grand champion. Brooke Downing won grand champion for her angora goats in the senior division.

Poultry

For Cedarcrest's representation in the poultry shows, we had three students showing at three levels of showmanship. Megan Reid showed her chicken which in turn landed her with the senior class grand champion ribbon. Ella Dianich showed her Japanese Bantam also receiving the grand champion placing in the junior division. In the novice show, Sierra Owens showed one of her chickens, and placed reserve grand champion of her show.

Landscape

Every year Cedarcrest FFA designs a landscape and installs it at the fairgrounds. This year two of our members, Megan Reid and Leila Misallati designed two different landscapes following the theme of this year's fair; "Summer Days and Country Ways". After creating a map of the design, and a plant list, Leila got 2nd place on her design, and Megan got 4th place out of many other designs in the competition.

Career Development Events

Our show team not only participated in every one of the Career Development Events (CDEs), but we placed top three in all of them. Overall, we got 1st place in the Veterinary Science CDE, Horse Judging CDE, Dairy Foods contest, and Potato Judging CDE. We got 2nd place in the Natural Resources CDE, and 3rd place in Tractor Driving CDE.

Round Robin

After competing all week, the exhibitors who won grand champion in the senior division are put into the Round Robin, where they show every single type of animal being shown by FFA kids to demonstrate how well they can handle and work with any animal. This year we had Megan Reid, Brooke Downing, and Ella Dianich all qualify to be in the Round Robin. After a stressful hour of competing, Ella Dianich won the Round Robin contest, becoming the first ever winner from Cedarcrest High School.

Congratulations

The 2018 Evergreen State Fair Supreme Exhibitor was Anna Christensen. This award goes to the livestock exhibitor who shows exemplary leadership skills and is an ambassador for agriculture. Anna is the first Cedarcrest student to receive this prestigious award.

Career & Technical Education Opportunities at Riverview School District

Each year, Career and Technical Education students graduate from high school with career goals, job preparation, and leadership skills knowing exactly where they'll go next to further their academic and hands-on education and training. CTE ensures flexible and relevant learning experiences that keep students engaged in their classes while providing a real-world, relevant, career-oriented curriculum. Through Career and Technical Education, students can explore career opportunities and learn how core curriculum subjects of math, science, reading, and writing are applied to real-life. CTE students at Riverview acquire skills and knowledge for future careers plus enhance their academic achievements so they will be prepared for entry into the workforce, careers, and college.

CTSO's - Career and Tech Student Organizations - Riverview offers numerous choices for students to be involved with and increase their employment/leadership skills. All students are invited to become a part of a CTSO or even participate in more than one option.

Organizations include: **DECA, FBLA, FFA, FIRST Robotics, TSA, and WCTSMA**

Work Site Learning- Work site learning activities extend the classroom into the workplace, connect acquired knowledge and skills from academics to a student's future employment, plus help students earn credits and money. A student must be 16 years old, have taken or be concurrently enrolled in a qualifying CTE course, set up an employer meeting with the WSL coordinator, and gain signed permissions from a parent and their employer. Goals and objectives are created to monitor learning within the individual work environment. Students can earn credit for unpaid internships, apprenticeships, as well as paid employment. Please see the CTE Director, Kari Schuh, for WSL sign ups.

Pacific Northwest College Credit (formerly Tech Prep)-starting as soon as 9th grade, students enrolled in Pacific Northwest College Credit can earn college credit in high school CTE courses that are aligned - "articulated" - with college courses. Save hundreds to thousands of dollars by enrolling now.

What are the steps for earning credit

1. Be currently enrolled in a "PNW College Credit" CTE high school class.
2. Register for the PNW College Credit program while they are in the class.. (<https://www.pnwcollegecredit.org/>)
3. Pay the \$50 annual consortium fee. If they paid first semester, just make sure you register for your new courses-there is no additional fee.
4. Receive a grade of "B" or higher in the class.

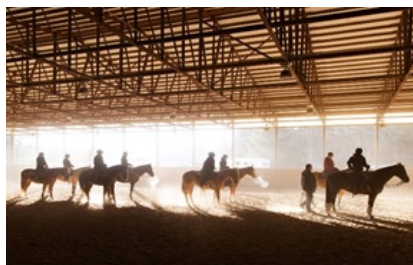
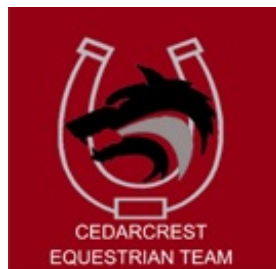
WANIC Summer Academy

The Team offers opportunities in nearly every horse discipline for individual events such as Dressage, Saddle Seat Equitation, Hunt Seat Equitation, Hunt Seat Over Fences, Stock Seat Equitation, Trail, Working Rancher, Driving, Showmanship, In-Hand Trail, In-Hand Obstacle Relay, Reining, Gaming (Barrels, Figure 8, Flags, Keyhole, Poles), and Cow Events (Breakaway Roping and Steer Daubing). Also available are team events such as Drill Team (Working Pairs, Working Fours, and 6+ Freestyle), Team Sorting, Team Canadian Flags, and Two-Man Birangle.

Since its inception in the 2015-16 season, the Cedarcrest Equestrian Team has sent 70-80% of its members to State EVERY year, has at least one representative at the regional meet at PNWIC, and has shown incredible growth in every event for all members each season!
